What Will This Class Be Like?

COURSE DESCRIPTION:

This course is designed specifically to teach students how to communicate clearly, think critically, and express their ideas and thoughts in college level essays. Students will learn to read and respond analytically to various sources and incorporate these sources into clearly organized academic essays while using college level concepts, diction, and textual support. Students will also learn to conduct academic-level research and incorporate it effectively into a research paper. The emphasis for this class will focuses on how the media shapes American society.

In addition to the classroom instruction, this class is also a hybrid class. This means that the students are required to participate in online instruction and assignments through Canvas.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS:

This course depends heavily on class participation; therefore, excessive absences, tardiness, and/or lack of preparation will adversely affect a student's grade. The students are responsible for all materials and work, and they will be required to download the assignments off the class Canvas website.

Completion of English 61 or EMLS 112 with a "C" or better or recommended score on the English placement test.

WHAT IS A HYBRID CLASS?

Hybrid (blended) courses are courses that combine face-to-face classroom instruction with online learning. Students will be required to attend instructional on-campus meetings, as well as online instruction. On campus required meeting dates are listed in the catalog. Information about hybrid classes such as course orientation or meeting dates, time and place, Questions Discussion Board, course requirements, and instructor contact information can be found at SAC DistEd. The course site on Canvas also contains a Questions Discussion Board and a Help page specifically for our class. Students may access course materials via the Internet either at home or using an on campus computer. It is extremely important that the students' current e-mail addresses are correct in the Personal Information and Notification sections of Canvas. Please contact the Distance Education office, (714) 564 -6725, if you do not receive your Canvas information in a timely matter.

ACCESS REQUIREMENTS:

Online and hybrid courses require students to have access to a computer with an individual e-mail account and Internet access. In this course students are required to access the course on Thursday to download the weekly assignments and notes. Students will also need to access Canvas throughout the week to complete the assignments. I recommend that


students who take this course have their own computer and a reliable Internet connection from home.

- ♦ Computers with Internet access are available to students in the Academic Computing Center in the Cesar Chavez Building (A106) and the SAC Nealley Library.
- Students taking online or hybrid courses should know how to use a browser, open and close applications, cut and paste, save a file and retrieve it, as well as view videos online.
- ♦ Students should also have basic Canvas skills to include:
 - Open, enter, and post to the discussion board
 - ♦ Submit an assignment and upload a document to Canvas.
 - Submit, read, and review comments on Turnitin.

♦ Check and monitor your grades. Hybrid and online classes are not easier than traditional, face-to-face courses. In fact online classes are a significant time commitment and require a tremendous amount of personal discipline. Online classes (especially Freshman English) are in high demand, so be sure you are ready to accept the commitment to this class.

ONLINE GROUND RULES:

- Treat all students' contributions with respect, even if you disagree with the statements. Understand that diverse opinions create interesting dynamics for the course.
- 2. Be patient with the technology used in this class. If something is not working, do not panic. E-mail me and I will try to help you as soon as possible.
- Ask for help from me or your classmates when you need it, and offer to help your fellow classmates.
- Understand that virtual communications are usually taken at face value; therefore, jokes and sarcasm rarely translate well to other readers and contributors.
- Post thought-provoking discussion responses that include examples and evidence or support to prove your point.
 Avoid responding with an unsupported opinion or just agreeing with the post.
- 6. Cite your sources whether it is an online article or another classmate's post in all your written work.



Expectations

This is a college-level course. College credits are based on the Carnegie Unit, the structure of the US Education System, for a system of "units". One semester unit represents one lecture hour of required classroom time and two hours of student preparation time. Thus, this four unit course requires, 4 lecture hours and 8 hours of student preparation, or approximately 10-12 hours total, per week that you will need to spend on this course.

Students may be required to electronically submit their written work to the Turnitin link on Canvas, and by taking this course, students agree that all assignments are subject to plagiarism detection processes and plagiarism penalties.

Assignments submitted to Turnitin by the student or instructor will become part of their database and will be used for plagiarism prevention and detection. Student papers, however, will remain the intellectual property of the author.

LATE ASSIGNMENTS AND MAKE UP POLICY

Assignments turned **in late** can receive no higher grade than a **79% (C+).** If the student has an excused absence, he or she may submit work for full credit on the day that the student returns to class. No make-ups will be allowed for the research paper and the final exam. **NO WORK** will be accepted after **December 14, 2017.**

- Canvas works best with Mozilla Firefox and Chrome. They also each have a built in spell-checker that comes in handy.
- Canvas is generally supported on mobile devices, but it is NOT recommended to take tests on a mobile platform.
- Our Canvas course contains a General Questions section as well as a Help section. I will answer Canvas functionality/feature questions within the first weeks of the semester, but I also encourage students to answer other students' questions posted in the online Questions discussion board.

How Will Grades Be Determined?


This is a points based class, so it is important to turn in all the assignments because a zero on an assignment substantially lowers a student's grade.

How Can I Keep Track of My Grades?

Student Learning Outcomes

STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES

Students will use the writing process to write, in proper MLA format, academic essays, including a documented research paper, using appropriately chosen details, organizational strategies, more complex sentence variety, and sufficiently correct grammar, punctuation, effective word choice, and style.

Students will be able to read critically for literal and implied meaning, identify main ideas, organizational strategies and authors' writing strategies as well as summarize, paraphrase, and analyze written works.

Students will evaluate and ethically use primary and secondary sources to avoid plagiarism and will use the library's resources, including online databases, to locate appropriate academic source material.

What Do I Need to Do?

Throughout the learning units, you will be assigned a variety of assignments (lecture notes, readings, quizzes, discussion posts, etc), which will measure your comprehension and participation in the class.

DISCUSSION POSTS:

This course depends heavily on class participation; therefore, students need to participate in the discussions each week by posting a well-thought-out reply to the topic on Thursday night by 11:59 PM. Students need to answer any questions and post replies to their classmates' responses by Tuesday at 11:59 PM. Plan on writing anywhere from three to five sentences for each discussion posting (grammar, spelling, and mechanics do count!). Late postings will not be accepted. In addition to the discussion questions, students should follow the course calendar for assignments, lecture notes, and quizzes each week. It is the student's responsibility to download the assignments and to complete them on time.

ONLINE HOMEWORK EXERCISES

The homework exercises for this class are to be completed on Canvas. Each of these assignments is worth 10 points and students may retake the assignment multiple times in order to learn the concepts and improve their scores. I will take the highest grade for all the attempts.

RESEARCH PAPER PROJECT

All Freshman Composition classes are required to complete a research essay. For this class, students will be turning in part of the essay throughout the semester. After the sections are turned in, I will comment on them and return them to the students, so they can make changes and corrections before the final research essay is due. These research assignments include, but are not limited to:

- Working thesis assignment (10 points)
- Library Workshop (online through Canvas) (50 points)
- Research Annotated Bibliography (100 points)
- Research Formal Outline (75 points)
- Research Rough Draft (50 points)
- Research Final Essay (200 points)

The research paper cannot be turned in late.

All assignments and due dates will be published and updated on the Canvas calendar.



MLA 8

Essays must be in MLA 8 format. The changes between MLA 7 and MLA 8 mostly have to do with the works cited entry formatting.

COURSE POLICIES:

GUIDELINES FOR ESSAYS

Students will be assigned two outside essays and one research project in this class. Students will need to create a rough draft and a final draft for each assignment. The rough drafts will be turned in as hard copies, and the final drafts will be submitted through a program called Turnitin on Canvas, which verifies essay originality.

Please type all essays into a word processing program and then convert them to a PDF file before uploading the essays to Turnitin/Canvas. Several word processing programs allow students to "Save As" a PDF file.

Essays are due on the dates listed on the tentative course outline. Each assignment must be typed and in MLA format. (A MLA Template for Essays is provided to students online).

ROUGH DRAFT & PEER EDITING WORKSHOPS

On the days specified in the schedule, students must bring their completed rough drafts to class for the Peer Evaluation/Editing Workshop. Each student will be responsible for reading and critiquing two essays each. Students should make competent, full-sentence remarks on the peer evaluation form.

The peer editing workshop will take place in class, but if a student should miss the workshop, it is his or her responsibility to get classmates to read and critique the essay outside of class. If students do not turn in the peer editing sheets, he or she will not receive the points. All of the members of the class can be reached through e-mail via the Canvas website.

Please note that students should notate whose essay he/she evaluated.

MLA FORMAT

All essay assignments must be in MLA 8 format. Please download the MLA template from Canvas and review the MLA help resources to become acquainted with MLA. Assignments that are not in MLA format will be returned to the student ungraded. Please see the guidelines listed below. For more information on MLA, please refer to the MLA format lecture notes, on-line videos, and the handbook.





How Do I Earn Extra Credit?

Students will have the ability to do **three 10 point extra credit assignments** within the semester. The extra credit opportunities will vary throughout the semester, but they will mainly consist of DLAs or tutoring in the Learning Center, documentary reviews, or events on campus. In order to use the Learning Center, students will need to enroll in the <u>Learning Center</u>.

THE LEARNING CENTER

The Learning Center is located in D307, and students will need to bring their student IDs and scan in each time they visit. Students can meet with a writing tutor/instructor up to three times for extra credit. Be sure to bring the signed form to me.
